




Class of 2017 Begins Third Year Internships

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Starship Enterprise Conservation

Our conservation scientists, Rebecca Ploeger and Aaron Shugar were featured in the Buffalo News this February for their work on helping to conserve the Starship Enterprise. Rebecca, an expert in polymers and synthetic materials, and Aaron, a metallurgy and instrumentation specialist, spent several weeks analyzing and interpreting tiny samples of material from the model that served as the spacecraft in the original "Star Trek" television series. Their work comes as part of a Smithsonian Institution effort to restore the USS Enterprise to its 1967 appearance. Ariel O'Connor ('09) and Malcolm Collum ('95) were also instrumental in the conservation of the Enterprise at the Smithsonian and reached out to Rebecca and Aaron for help. The Enterprise is now on display at the National Air and Space Museum celebrating the 50th anniversary of the first broadcast of the "Star Trek" pilot episode.

She opened her own studio, Bronwyn Eves Conservation Studios, Inc. in 1999.

Bronwyn is survived by her husband, Bill; her daughters, Sophia and Amelia; her mother, Patricia Lloyd; and her sisters, Glynis Bell of Arlington, VA and Meaghan Lloyd of Los Angeles, CA.



Dorothy Warner Lawson

Dorothy Warner Lawson ('73) passed away peacefully at home on Bowen Island in British Columbia on 30 August 2015. Born in the 1920s in Nebraska, she taught art history at San Francisco University. She became a mature age student in the first class of the art conservation training program at Cooperstown N.Y., which later moved to SUNY Buffalo. She completed her internship in paper conservation at the Fogg Art Museum at Harvard University in 1973 and was appointed paper conservator at the Maine State Museum. She married Cooperstown classmate and objects

conservator Eric Lawson and relocated to Canada and in 1979 moved to Bowen Island where she and Eric established Lawson Conservation Services. Dorothy and Eric had many interests including literature and history and co-authored a book on the history of Bowen Island. They travelled extensively and had friends around the world and very full lives. Eric passed away last year. Both will be missed by conservation colleagues as well as the Bowen Island community.

Donald Keith Sebera

Donald Keith Sebera, of South Palm Beach, Florida and Easton, Maryland, died of natural causes in Easton on Thursday, August 27, 2015. He attained 87 years of age. Donald was born April 6, 1928 in Chicago. He attended Lane Technical High School and studied at the University of Chicago, earning 4 degrees, including a PhD in Chemistry. After graduate school, he enlisted in the Army, where he advanced to the rank of Lieutenant and served in the Chemical Corps during the Korean conflict. Upon leaving the Army, he began his career in academia as Professor at Wesleyan University in Middletown, Connecticut where he taught chemistry to undergraduates and supervised graduate students for 12 years. During his tenure at Wesleyan, Dr. Sebera became interested in the scientific aspects of works of art. Following a sabbatical at the Canadian Conservation Institute in Ottawa, Canada, he left Wesleyan to develop the science program at the fledgling Center for Historic and Artistic Works in Art Conservation associated with the State University of New York in Cooperstown. He returned to the CCI for a number of years before moving on to the University of Delaware, where he was Professor of chemistry and science in the art conservation program. He also taught chemistry at Washington College in Chestertown, Maryland. He ended his career at the Library of Congress in Washington, DC where he developed a system of isoperm curves that chart the constant durability of materials in relation to temperature and relative humidity. Dr. Sebera was awarded several patents related to his research. Amongst many honors, he served as President of the American Institute for Conservation, the professional association of art conservators, which named him an Honorary Member in recognition for his many contributions to the field. He is also the author of Electronic Structure and Chemical Bonding, a chemistry text-book that has been translated into several languages.

Donald married his high school sweetheart, Patricia Ruth Sebera (nee Juergens) who predeceased him in 2000. They were married for 47 years, and are survived by their children Mary Sebera of Baltimore, Laura Sebera of Cooperstown, NY, Robert Sebera of Piles Grove, NJ, and Diana Sebera of Toronto, Ontario. He is also survived by six grandchildren, his sister Olga Cucci of Bradenton, FL and his brother Gregory Soohov of Menomonie, WI. He was married to Martha Morales Sebera, (nee Rivers) of Clifton, NJ, and is survived by her son Christopher Morales of Falls Church, VA. Also surviving is Joanne Hart of Trappe, his beloved partner with whom he shared the last eight years of his life happily in Maryland and South Palm Beach. Her son Alex Hart lives in Woodstock, Maryland. Donald lived life to the fullest, believing in "making my own luck" and "going first class". He was curious about the world, travelling widely and reading extensively about any subject. He was an accomplished cook, cake baker, tailor, furniture maker and house renovator. He sang along with Frank Sinatra, relished blue crabs and savored Macallans whiskey. He enjoyed a good debate and loved champagne, but perhaps his favorite activity was sitting in the sun, doing the crossword, and watching the waves from his Florida balcony. He will be sorely missed.
