The department had the pleasure of welcoming the Class of 2019 back to campus this September for their final talks. After a day of presentations about their summer and third year experiences, we celebrated the class on the front lawn of Rockwell Hall with a reception and champagne toast. Congrats to the Class of 2019 on your graduation and excellent final presentations! We are excited to announce the new positions of our 46th graduating class: Karen **Bishop** began a post-graduate internship in decorative arts and sculpture conservation at the J. Paul Getty Museum; *Allison Brewer* is now the assistant paper conservator at the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco; *Carolyn Burns* and *LaStarsha McGarity* are both Andrew W. Mellon Fellows at the National Gallery of Art - Carolyn in paper conservation and LaStarsha in objects conservation; *Courtney Helion* spent her third year interning in photograph conservation at Gawain Weaver Conservation where she will remain as the assistant conservator; *Clara Huisman* was recently appointed the Andrew W. Jonathan Thornton to Retire

Professor Jonathan Thornton ('80) will retire at the end of the Fall 2019 semester after 39 years of teaching in the program. Following an earlier career as an artist and silversmith, he studied conservation in this department when it was in Cooperstown and received his MA and Certificate of Advanced Studies from SUNY Oneonta. He has always had a strong interest in historic craft technologies and continues to explore this area by researching period treatises and by reproducing historic craft tools. Over the past four decades, his conservation research has been focused on flat glass, ivory and similar materials, in addition to gilded and polychrome surfaces on woodwork and picture frames.

Jonathan was a Rome Prize recipient in 1999 where he researched the materials and techniques of molding and casting while a fellow at the American Academy in Rome.

It is an understatement to say Jonathan is a master craftsman interested in traditional handmade tools and historic technologies. He has crafted dozens of beautiful hand tools using historic methods and materials and has brought this knowledge and expertise to the classroom. One of the department's favorite events is the Days of Fire workshop run by both Jonathan and Aaron. Students get to experience the tools and techniques used during the Iron Age for forging and casting that would not be possible without the enthusiasm of Jonathan and Aaron and their willingness to create this authentic experience. Jonathan singlehandedly shaped the objects conservation curriculum and has been a mentor to generations of our alumni in the field. We all wish Jonathan a very happy retirement and well-deserved time to spend with his family and to explore his many creative endeavors.

Dear Alumni, Family, Friends & Supporters,

I hope this letter finds you well and that you have had an enjoyable Thanksgiving holidav.

I find it hard to believe that in 2020 the department will have reached its 50-year milestone. It is both a time to celebrate and a time to reflect on the many accomplishments of the department and of its alumni since 1973 when the first class graduated.

Hearty thanks go out to all 241 alumni who participated in the survey. We had a 52% response rate, which is fantastic! From a social science/survey viewpoint, a good survey has a 30% response rate. Our 52% is phenomenal and a testament that we care about our Buffalo/Cooperstown program. We have begun to analyze the data and look forward to providing a summary in the near future. After a quick glance at the results, there are many useful suggestions, ideas, and strong views on what the program should be doing now and in the future. Stay tuned for more is to come.

As I think of 50 years of the program's alumni from Cooperstown and alumni from Buffalo, the two locations, and the many accomplishments that we have all achieved collectively and independently, I am grateful for where we find ourselves at this point in time. I am thankful to all the previous directors and past faculty and staff members for laying down a solid educational and practical foundation, and to current faculty and staff members for their hard work in building on earlier successes. From the Cooperstown days, Sheldon and Caroline Keck established the program and gave it an excellent start. Many of our alumni from the 1970s work in major museums, hold senior conservation

positions, are in private practice, and some are beginning to retire. In the early 1980s, F. Chris Tahk took the reins for over 20 years, transferred the program to Buffalo in 1987, and continued to strengthen the program. Elizabeth Peña and James Hamm further refined the program.

We are sincerely thankful to the many philanthropic foundations that have generously supported the program for the past 50 years. Since the beginning, the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation has supported us by funding graduate student fellowships and a named professorship in conservation science. Recently, the Garman Family Foundation generously supported graduate student fellowships and faculty professional development. The Stockman Family Foundation has also generously funded graduate student fellowships and the Samuel H. Kress Foundation has supported summer student internship educational endeavors for over a decade. In addition, the National Endowment for the Humanities. Preservation and Access Division, has generously supported our educational efforts over the past five

I also enthusiastically thank the past and current membership of the Alumni Board. They have been instrumental in keeping all of us from Cooperstown and Buffalo from 1973 to 2019 connected and interacting with each other. The 241 alumni participating in the survey is evidence of this. Let us continue to remain in contact.

I look forward to seeing as many Cooperstown and Buffalo alumni as possible at the AIC 2020 Salt Lake City where we will celebrate Jonathan's (class of 1980) retirement. We are happy to announce some recent accomplishments by department faculty and staff.

Jiuan Jiuan (J.J.) Chen ('01) was granted a one year sabbatical which she is completing this academic year at Yale University's Institute for Preservation of Cultural Heritage. While there, she is focusing on researching the effects of UV and X-ray on cultural heritage materials, writing a handbook for multimodal imaging, and investigating both multispectral and hyperspectral imaging to strengthen her curriculum. J.J. was also given permanent appointment / tenure as of the Fall 2019 semester.

Rembrandt in Rockwell

In May 2019, the department welcomed the *Portrait of a Young* Man in an Arm Chair (ca. 1660) by Rembrandt Harmensz van Riin from the Memorial Art Gallery of the University of Rochester.

Under the direction of Ms. Fiona Beckett, assistant professor of paintings conservation and Ms. Nancy Norwood, the Memorial Art Gallery's curator of European art. the painting underwent a wide range of imaging and scientific analysis to learn more about its composition and history. The main goal of this partnership was to gather more information about this painting using primarily non-invasive methods while giving department faculty and students the opportunity to study the techniques and materials of an artistic master. Data is being analyzed in detail and compared to current Rembrandt research.

Ms. Jiuan Jiuan (J.J.) Chen ('01), associate professor of conservation imaging, and Andrew W. Mellon professor of conservation science, Dr. Aaron Shugar played key roles in the imaging and analysis of the Rembrandt. J.J. photographed the painting in high-resolution, infrared and ultraviolet radiation, and X-ray. These methods can reveal underdrawings, surface features, and key structural components of the painting. Aaron used a custom-made mount to scan the main compositional elements of the painting with a stateof-the-art X-ray fluorescence (XRF)

scanner to determine the elemental composition of its materials. XRF can help identify pigments, minerals, and gives extensive quantitative and qualitative data. Graduate students specializing in paintings conservation Melissa Amundsen ('20), Rachel Childers ('20), and Anna Ersenkal ('20), as well as Nicole Schmidt ('21), assisted with the analysis, documentation, handling, and crating of the

It was thrilling to faculty, students, and friends to have the opportunity to view and examine this masterpiece. Several of our most generous donors were invited to experience the painting and were in awe. We are grateful for the cooperation and support of the Memorial Art Gallery. We look forward to continuing this partnership and expanding our knowledge and research on their fine collection.

Department Awarded Stockman Grant

This fall, the department received a \$250,000 gift from the Stockman Family Foundation. The gift will be added to the Stockman Family Endowment, which was established at the college in 1996. It is intended to fund graduate fellowships in the program.

The late Hervey S. Stockman Sr. and his wife, Sally, were accomplished artists who set up the Stockman Family Foundation Trust in 1991 to benefit arts, cultural, and educational institutions. Based in New York City, the foundation includes funding for organizations that support specific art conservation projects, encourage acquisition of equipment or laboratory facilities, and provide teaching opportunities in the field. The Stockmans began giving to the art conservation program many years ago, and their children, including son Hervey "Peter" Stockman, the president of the foundation, and his wife, Dyson, continue to make contributions, noted Patrick Ravines, director and associate professor of art conservation.

"We are deeply grateful to the Stockman family," Ravines said. "As we prepare to celebrate the department's 50th anniversary next year, we are humbled by the family's recognition of the department's ongoing contribution to the preservation of art and cultural heritage. Gifts such as this one enable us to attract the best and brightest students to the program."



Community Outreach Activities

Faculty and students have been busy with community outreach projects within the Western New York area. The above photo shows the Class of 2020 with Dr. Rebecca Ploeger at Inn Buffalo, a boutique bed and breakfast located on Lafayette Avenue. Built in 1898, the historic mansion has many unique and one of a kind finishes such as gold leaf ceilings, hand-painted stencil work, silk damask, and century old tapestries making it the perfect place for Rebecca's Preventive Conservation class. The students help with preventive care and maintenance issues in addition to consulting on future conservation work. Rebecca has taken her classes there for three years and has built a great relationship for the students to get real life experience and practical preventive skills.

During the spring and fall semesters, faculty and students visited the Seneca-Iroquois National Museum, in Salamanca, NY, to reaffirm our long-standing partnership between our two institutions. The museum recently moved into a new building and is currently assessing collection conservation and preservation issues. The department is committed to helping conserve their collection. We are consulting with them on identifying objects for conservation treatment that may have mold damage, and on preventive conservation issues such as

the temperature and relative humidity of storage environments and pesticide residues on taxidermy.

focus drastically improved my ingenuity, creative, and independence as an early career conservator. As I venture into the world, I will not have the burden of repaying student debt which will allow me to continue my mission of volunteering with Historically Black Colleges and Universities as well as other underserved institutions to preserve their collections as best as possible.

In 2020, the Garman Art Conservation Department will celebrate its 50th anniversary. It is incredible how we have grown and changed since the program was founded in 1970 as the Cooperstown Graduate Program, affiliated with SUNY College at Oneonta. Over the past fifty years, we have successfully graduated 460 students, improved and expanded our facilities, grown the number of conservation specialties for students to study, and worked tirelessly to secure endowed funds to ensure the future of our program.

Students are in classes from 9am - 5pm Monday - Friday, and on nights and weekends they are working on conservation treatment projects, research, and course work. This densely packed schedule makes it impossible for students to have part-time jobs. The graduate fellowships the department provides all students allows them to focus and concentrate fully on their education.
