M.A./M.S. Dual Degree Approved by NYSED

We want to let alumni and friends know that we are in the final stages of being able to change the offered degree from an M.A. and Certificate of Advanced Study to a dual award of an M.A. in Conservation of Art and Cultural Heritage and an M.S. in Conservation Science and Imaging. The department still needs the approval of the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD) before we can make the official announcement. The new M.A./M.S. will prepare students for careers as professional conservators and better reflect the department's cross-disciplinary education of both theory and practice. Courses remain the same but have been rearranged to meet the requirements of both M.A. and M.S. degrees. The dual degrees were approved by the New York State Education Department (NYSED) in October 2021. The process to make this change has taken over five years of paperwork, reviewing and rewriting course descriptions, getting Buffalo State approvals and then crafting proposals for SUNY system administration and NYSED's approval. This required an immense amount of time and dedication to see it through. We are excited that our incoming students will now have recognition for the amount of coursework undertaken and leave our program with two masters. FROM THE DIRECTOR



Dear Alumni, Family, Friends & Supporters,

I hope this email finds you and your families well and staying healthy. It is hard to believe that we are approaching the two-year mark of the plague-like SARS-CoV-2 viral pandemic and that we are still under its spell. We have adapted to the pandemic as best as possible and have been forging new ways of living under these circumstances.

This is an exciting time for Buffalo State because this year the college celebrates 150 years of education, research and service to the city of Buffalo and the Western New York Community. The college is proud of its long history as an active educational partner in the city and region. And for 50 years the conservation programs at Cooperstown and Buffalo have been intimately involved with Buffalo's cultural and art institutions in the conservation and restoration of their collections. A shout-out to all of our alumni for their conservation activities that contributed to the preservation and access of local and regional histories, and that made exhibitable art and cultural objects of the many institutions, cultures and peoples of the city and the region.

Over the past year, we have continued with our conservation education mandate and accomplished quite a bit. We ended the academic year 2020-2021 using a hybrid system, a combination of online/remote instruction and in-person lab and studio sessions, which worked well given the circumstances. For fall 2021, Buffalo State College President Katherine Conway-Turner wanted all students, faculty, and staff to return to campus for in person classes with a host of safety protocols in place. We have

managed well and as the semester comes to a close, I send my hearty thanks and congratulations to all grad students, faculty, and staff for their hard work, for being able to pivot from in person to online on short notice, and to keeping teaching lectures and labs moving forward. This has been a major educational achievement.

Another major event that came into being earlier this year was that the college combined the School of Arts and **Humanities and the School of Natural** and Social Sciences this fall to create the new School of Arts and Sciences. This is now the largest school on campus and we are in good company with 19 other departments and 10 interdepartmental

We are extremely pleased to make the soft announcement that the New York State Education Department (NYSED) approved the creation of the new dual MA/MS program in conservation. An MA in Conservation of Art and Cultural Heritage and a new MS in Conservation Science and Imaging will be awarded starting in fall 2022. We are making this soft announcement since we have one step left before we can make an official announcement. We need to seek permission from the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD), the organization that accredits the arts programs at Buffalo State College. Work on this has already begun.

We look forward to 2022 and are optimistic that the pandemic will slowly ease during the year.

I wish you all a merry, restful, and healthy holiday season and a very Happy New Year.

Faculty Updates

Faculty had a very full plate last academic year trying to regroup and teach conservation, conservation science, and imaging in a hybrid format with both online and inperson content. Hundreds of hours went in to shifting classes to different configurations and coming up with creative ways to deliver content during the pandemic. A huge thank you to all faculty who went above and beyond to teach and help students through this difficult time. Faculty managed to also do some remarkable research and accomplish many achievements during the past year and here are a few highlights:

Fiona Beckett is in the process of treating a large scale 19th-century painting by American artist Ridgway Knight entitled "Springtime", owned by the Albright-Knox Art Gallery. Jiuan Jiuan Chen ('01) has been studying whether the dosage of UVA or x-rays used during the imaging process can affect the long-term preservation of cellulosic materials, with research being conducted at the Institute for the Preservation of Cultural Heritage (IPCH) at Yale University during her 2019-20 academic vear sabbatical. Emily Hamilton ('11) was co-organizer of TechFocus IV: Caring for 3D-printed Art, an international virtual conference in November. This fall, Aaron Shugar co-authored an article published in Scientific Reports titled, "Rapid identification of wood species using XRF and neural network machine learning". Theresa Smith ('06) was promoted this year from Assistant to Associate Professor in the department. David Sheets, Marianne Webb and Patrick Ravines virtually presented at Archiving 2021 and CollectionCare 2021 and have conference papers in the proceedings of both on a study involving surface metrology and data science of Asian lacquers. This is a collaboration with the Getty Conservation Institute's Asian Lacquer project headed by Michael Schilling and Herant Khanjian. In addition, Aaron Shugar, Rebecca Ploeger, and Meredeth Lavelle published "A Review of 50 Years of Teaching Conservation Science at SUNY Buffalo State" in the Journal of the American Institute for Conservation discussing the evolution, challenges, and future of conservation science education from the perspective of the Buffalo State Art Conservation program.

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Red Jacket Peace Medal Repatriation

On May 17, 2021, the Red Jacket Peace Medal was repatriated to the Seneca People in front of a crowd of 160 at the Onöhsagwë:de' Cultural Center on the Allegany Territory. The medal was previously in the care of the Buffalo History Museum. Under NAGPRA (Native Graves Protection and Repatriation Act), the Nation requested the return of the Red Jacket Peace Medal as an object of cultural patrimony that has significant historical and ongoing cultural and traditional importance not only to our community but to all Seneca peoples.

The medal was gifted to Seneca Chief Red Jacket by President George Washington in 1792 to commemorate discussions that culminated in the Treaty of Canandaigua of 1794, in which the Seneca Nation served a crucial role. It was given as a symbol of peace, friendship and enduring relationships among the United States and the Six Nations. The Peace Medal is now being held at the Onöhsagwë:de' Cultural Center in Salamanca and is currently on display for public viewing.

Members of the department faculty and several students were invited to attend the ceremony and were honored to be a part of this historic event.

The department was saddened to learn of the passing of Dr. F. Christopher Tahk in December 2020. He was a SUNY Distinguished Service Professor of Conservation Science and Director of the department from 1983-2004. Chris was incredibly dedicated to our department and is one of the four original faculty members that spearheaded the charge to bring us to our current home in Buffalo from Cooperstown. He was a beloved professor. raised millions of dollars to stabilize the department with grants and endowments, and was an enthusiastic administrator and colleague always pushing the department forward while advocating for faculty and students. For those of us that had the pleasure of learning from him and were able to call him a colleague, he will be sorely missed.

His family has asked for privacy and that Chris be remembered through memorial contributions to the department. All donations we have received in his honor have gone into the Chris Tahk Fellowship fund to directly help students.

From the Buffalo News and Legacy.com: Frederick Christopher Tahk, Age 81, of Orchard Park, NY, passed peacefully on December 17, 2020. Chris was the beloved husband of Charlotte Tay Tahk; loving father of Alexander (Susannah) Tahk and Kathleen (Bryan) Tahk Lassner, and loving grandfather of Serena Tahk, Samuel Tahk, and Freyja Tahk Lassner.

With a PhD in Chemistry and an M.A. in Art Conservation, Chris spent his career as Professor of Conservation Science and Director of the Buffalo State College Patricia H. and Richard E. Garman Art Conservation Department, retiring in 2004. A lifelong antiques collector, he was active with the National Association of Watch and Clock Collectors and the Early American Industries Association.

Katherine Eirk

Katherine Giles Eirk (Veazey), 76, died of COVID-19 December 20, 2020 at Baptist Hospital East, Louisville, KY. She was the younger of two daughters of Robert Giles and Alice Bittner Eirk of Madisonville, Ky. Her parents and elder sister, Martha Jeanne Eirk Veneman, predeceased her.

Katherine earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Kentucky and a Master's degree from George Washington University in Washington, D.C. During a distinguished career in

fine art conservation, operating from the Washington, D.C. area, she worked at the Conservation Analytical Lab at the Smithsonian, the National Collection of Fine Arts (now the Smithsonian American Art Museum), and as a contract conservator at the Corcoran Gallery of Art. One of her projects while at the Smithsonian was the successful removal of a ball-point pen stain from the foot of the original Teddy Bear. In addition she taught paper conservation at both the Cooperstown and the Oberlin College graduate conservation programs, and worked on portrait miniatures for the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Yale University Art Gallery. Her specialties were paper conservation, Fabergé decorative objects, Joseph Cornell boxes, and, closest to her heart, portrait miniatures. Her advice was sought by students and experts in the field up to the time of her death.

In October 1997, Katherine married Ed Veazey, her high school sweetheart, During their happy years together, they moved to Louisville and pursued many interests, including traveling, antiques and ballroom dancing, making friends wherever they went. They were members of the Pendennis Club and were active in the Association of the Louisville Orchestra. Katherine was a member of Delta Zeta sorority and was the current president of Questers Chapter #124, Falls of the Ohio. She was a lifetime lover of horses.

Inge-Lise Eckmann Lane (1950 - 2021), Fellow of the American Institute for Conservation and the International Institute for Conservation, served as Chief Conservator and Deputy Director at the San Francisco



Museum of Modern Art over more than twenty years supervising the exhibition, collection, conservation and education programs of the Museum. In addition to holding a private practice in conservation of contemporary art, Ms. Eckmann Lane served as Chairman of Heritage Preservation, the National Conservation Institute, President of the Western Association of Art Conservators, and Chair of the Membership Committee (fellowship review committee) of the American Institute for Conservation. Ms. Eckmann Lane was one of the Founding Board Members of VoCA and acted as the first Board President from 2007 - 2014. She held an M.A. and certificate of advanced study in Art Conservation from the State University of New York, Cooperstown Graduate Program, and a BA from Bennington College.

In 2001 she received the Lifetime Achievement Award for Conservation Advocacy from the American Institute for Conservation and Artistic Works and University Products in recognition of sustained public outreach and advocacy to advance the field of conservation. In 2018, Eckmann Lane welcomed guests to the VoCA Summit held at SFMOMA and shared a bit of background about the origins of the organization and its Artist Interview Workshops.

Tool Kits Donated for 1st Year Students

The department has been very fortunate to have received a gift from The Ted M. & Sarah N. Seldin Fund to help support graduate students as they embark on their art conservation studies. These donors wish to encourage new members in the field by providing necessary tools that will aid their work as students and professionals. Normally, 1st year students had to bear the cost of about \$300 worth of conservation tools at the start of their 1st semester. 


A Virtual ANAGPIC 2021
