





#### **Limited Edition Rockwell Hall Print**

The Art Conservation Department is excited to announce a limited edition Rockwell Hall print designed and created by Chris Fritton, master letterpress printer, founder of Buffalo's Small Press Book Fair, and former Studio Director of the Western New York Book Arts Center. Buffalo is a treasure trove of American architecture of the late 19th and early 20th century and over the past four years, Chris has created a series of prints capturing Buffalo's most impressive architecture. These 2-dimensional homages to local landmarks reflect Buffalo's keen attention to preserve its architectural heritage.

Chris used vintage metal and wood type, printers' ornaments, and decorative cuts to create the Rockwell prints. He also used the backs of printing blocks to achieve textures and unexpected results in the design. Each print is composed of five colors and measures 11" x 17". This is a limited edition print run from the Buffalo architectural series, and each print is signed and numbered. We are extremely proud that Rockwell Hall has joined the illustrious list of architectural landmarks in this print series. Barbara Buckley ('83) and S Gwenanne Edwards ('12) made an extraordinary discovery at the Barnes Foundation in February 2015. During their conservation treatment of two Paul Cézanne watercolors, Barbara and Gwenanne discovered two previously unseen drawings on the reverse side of each sending shock waves through the art world and full coverage in the NY Times (photo above).

Irena Calinescu ('93) was featured on CBS Sunday Morning for her work on the Cowardly Lion costume from the Wizard of Oz. #### ART CONSERVATION DEPARTMENT ANDREW W. MELLON CHALLENGE GRANT FOR GRADUATE STUDENT FELLOWSHIPS

We are excited to announce that this past summer, we were awarded a prestigious and significant grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation to bolster graduate student fellowships. It is a challenge grant where the Mellon Foundation provides \$1.25 million and Buffalo State is charged with raising \$750,000 in cash by June 2017. The resulting \$2 million endowment fund will ensure continuous support for future generations of professional conservators.

We were founded in 1970 as the Cooperstown Graduate Program in the Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works, affiliated with the SUNY College at Oneonta. Since its founding, the department has offered a master of arts degree and certificate of advanced study in art conservation following a three year program of study. In 1983, the program transferred to Buffalo State, and relocated to the campus in 1987. The department today occupies a superb modern facility in Rockwell Hall, expressly designed to support conservation teaching and research. Buffalo State's Art Conservation Department is one of the leading programs of its kind in North America. We accept only 10 students a year and our competitive three-year graduate program trains conservators of fine art and material cultural heritage. Graduates can be found in the conservation labs of major institutions across the United States, including the National Gallery of Art, the Library of Congress, and the Museum of Modern Art in New York. Students have a rigorous three year full-time course load that does not allow them to have any type of part time employment. To help our students with their living expenses and to allow them to focus on their studies, we provide all of our students with modest educational fellowships. This support is crucial to their success in the program and also helps our department to attract the best and brightest applicants to

This Mellon Challenge Grant will significantly help our department to solidify its student fellowship program, however, to meet this challenge, we need your help to meet our match. Please consider a gift to help us succeed and ensure that our students will continue to be leaders in the field of conservation.
